TORAH: An Ethos of Access

וַיִדַבֵּר יִ-ה-וַ-ה אֱל־מֹשֶׁה בָּמִדְבַּר סִינַי...

"And the Holy One spoke to Moses in the Wilderness of Sinai..." Numbers 1:1

MIDRASH: The giving of Torah was accompanied by three things: by fire, by water, and by wilderness. Why was the giving of the Torah marked by these three features? This is to tell you that just as these three things are free to all who come into the world, so also are the words of the Torah free to all who come into the world...

Davar acher/another explanation of the text, "AND GOD SPOKE TO MOSES IN THE WILDERNESS OF SINAI:" Anyone who does not throw himself open to all like a wilderness cannot acquire wisdom and Torah." BaMidbar Rabbah 1:7

"Just as divine revelation and the Torah arise from the physical space of wilderness, of *midbar*—at the burning bush and then at Mount Sinai— a heart infused with divine Torah arises through a person's mindful cultivation of their own interior wilderness. One should seek to attain the level of *hefker*—of feeling unbound by the pride and egoism of ownership, of being unattached to materialism. In *hefker* consciousness, we train our spiritual sight to see the Divine Presence that dwells beneath the surface, beneath the many golden calves of our obsessions, possessions, and wayward priorities. This is a radical reinvention of the concept of *hefker* (a neutral halakhic category of abandonment and ownerlessness.

To receive the revelation of Torah— or perhaps a bit less grandly, to let Torah take root in one's heart— a person must first make themselves into a *midbar*, an inner empty wilderness that is cleared of all the weeds and brush that obstruct true perception and feeling. A wilderness that returns to the first purity of nature. – Prof. Ethan Fishbane, JTS Commentary
