TORAH: The Unbearable Beauty of Being

On the third day, as morning dawned, there was thunder, and lightning, and a dense cloud upon the mountain, and a very loud blast of the horn; and all the people who were in the camp trembled. Moses led the people out of the camp toward God, and they took their places at the foot of the mountain. Now Mount Sinai was all in smoke, for the LORD had come down upon it in fire; the smoke rose like the smoke of a kiln, and the whole mountain trembled violently. The blare of the horn grew louder and louder. As Moses spoke, God answered him in thunder...

And Moses went down to the people and spoke to them. God spoke all these words, saying: I the LORD am your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, the house of bondage...

All the people saw the thunder and lightning, the blare of the horn and the mountain smoking; and when the people saw it, they fell back and stood at a distance. "You speak to us," they said to Moses, "and we will obey; but let not God speak to us, lest we die." Moses answered the people, "Be not afraid; for God has come only in order to test you, and in order that the fear of God may be ever with you, so that you do not go astray." So the people remained at a distance, while Moses approached the thick cloud where God was.

Thus revelation is certainly not Law-giving. It is only this: Revelation. The primary content of revelation is revelation itself. "God came down" [on Sinai] -- this already concludes the revelation; "God spoke" is the beginning of interpretation, and certainly "I am." - Franz Rosenzweig, On Jewish Learning, p. 118:
