

# Welcome to Mishkan. We're glad you're here.

Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook said that the task of the modern Jew is to make the old new, and the new holy. In 2011, when Mishkan began hosting services in peoples' living rooms, everything felt new, like the sizzling freshness of a brand new relationship or job, when, amid the adrenaline rush you say to yourself, "This is so great... I hope this thing lasts!"

There are lots of good reasons to have doubted our longevity. More synagogues and churches across the country are closing their doors than ever before, and demographic studies all point to young adults being absent in the religious institutions of our parents and grandparents. But...

Seven years later, Mishkan has grown to represent a spiritual revival. Contrary to the studies, our fastest growing demographic is young adults and families, and over half of our members (we call them Builders) are under 40. With our staff of nine, we impact the lives of more than 3,500 unique people across Chicago annually through our services, Jewish learning and conversion classes, wellness workshops, collaborative music making, and thousands more across the globe through original videos and music online. This past May, I got a handwritten thank you note from a teenager in Albuquerque saying how listening to our SoundCloud page had given him confidence to participate in and lead services. That kind of inclusive spirit - transcending even geography – is what continues to excite me about our work every day.

But most importantly, people come to Mishkan not out of a stale sense of guilt or obligation, but out of a sense of hope and what's possible. And that sizzling new feeling didn't stop after year one, either. Between our ever-growing portfolio of justice partnerships, kids' and family programs, Jewish learning, and spirituality groups, we thrive on keeping things fresh.

This past year we went through our first-ever strategic planning process to figure out how to hang on to the adrenaline and nimble approach of startup culture, while building a strong foundation for long-term sustainability (read more about our strategic priorities on page 6). I probably would have choked on my challah hearing the words "long-term sustainability" seven years ago. Won't planning for the future take the fun out of living in the present? I'm so grateful to have learned from so many of you that if we care about something then we have to think about how to protect it for the future. So if we want to keep kicking tuchas now... we'd better be thinking about how to raise up inspired, down-to-earth generations and keeping our organization strong for the long haul.

Thank you for being part of the movement to reimagine and breathe new life into Judaism. May you be inscribed for a year of revolutionary love, health, hope, and inspiration,


# Radically inclusive.

### **Mensches-in-training**


